THINGS TO DO in your MetroParks as selected by lead park technician RAMON WATSON

Ramon Watson has worked at six different MetroParks during his 27 years at Five Rivers MetroParks, from Taylorsville MetroPark in northern Montgomery County to Cox Arboretum MetroPark south of Dayton. Now located at Germantown MetroPark as a lead park technician, Watson's recommendations for fall and winter fun outdoors are a must for those who want a solo adventure, in addition to adventures with friends and family. In addition, Watson highly recommends taking in the changing fall colors from atop the Tree Tower at Cox Aboretum MetroPark.

1) TRAIL TIME WITH FUR FRIENDS

The more temperate fall weather is the perfect time to hit the trails - for both pets and people. Watson - who has a husky shepherd named Sheba - recommends the 1.4-mile green trail at Germantown MetroPark or the 1.1-mile blue trail at Cox Arboretum MetroPark.

2) FALL FISHING

Watson highly recommends fishing for bass or bluegill at Twin Creek or Possum Creek MetroParks this fall. See page 10 and visit MetroParks' website to learn more about fishing, including places where a license is not required.

3) CAMP OUT

Years before Watson worked at Germantown MetroPark, his church group visited Camp Hook for an outing that created fond memories. He suggests camping in either Germantown or Twin Creek MetroParks so visitors can experience the Twin Valley Backpacking Trail. He also suggests the new trailside camping spot at Taylorsville MetroPark. METROPARKS.ORG/CAMPING

4) PLAN A PICNIC

Cooler weather makes for fewer insects and beautiful views. Grab some goodies from the 2nd Street Market and set up at a picnic table for a casual occasion or rent a shelter to accommodate a larger group. Watson recommends Englewood MetroPark, as he had his first family picnic there nearly 27 years ago. He also recommends Paw Paw Shelter at Hills & Dales and the shelters at Wesleyan for larger functions. METROPARKS.ORG/EASY

5) SNOW FUN

While he's never tried it himself, Watson has watched cross country skiers and snowshoers have a blast in the parks after a fresh snow. Either activity is best on paved and relatively flat natural surface trails. Try the 1.8-mile yellow trail at Cox Arboretum MetroPark or the 1.6-mile silver trail at Germantown MetroPark. Those who want to hike longer, more difficult trails in the snow can use snow spikes!





ON THE COVER

A beautiful winter sunset at Huffman MetroPark.







A 46-acre property tucked in a west Dayton neighborhood includes some beautiful surprises: a tranquil pond, a rocky beach along Wolf Creek, a trail through the woods.

Five Rivers MetroParks acquired this property in 2018 thanks to Calvary Missionary Baptist Church, the land's previous owner, and a Clean Ohio Greenspace Conservation Program grant. More recently, in 2021, MetroParks acquired two additional properties totaling about 12 acres and located along Wolf Creek just north of the Calvary land. All three properties will soon connect to Wesleyan MetroPark; work is already underway to clean up and restore that land — and fulfill long-term plans for it to expand that MetroPark in west Dayton to 100 acres.

"MetroParks acquired this land to expand Wesleyan MetroPark and to link it to additional neighborhoods and residents in the area," said Carrie Scarff, MetroParks' chief of planning and projects. "These acquisitions also will create a contiguous, open space corridor along the Wolf Creek."

Expanding parks is only one reason MetroParks acquires land, an ongoing process that started with the creation of the park district in 1963. Two years later, the fledgling park district set a land acquisition goal of 8,500 acres to protect open space in the region, which was growing rapidly at that time.

Today, that park district is your Five Rivers MetroParks, which protects nearly 16,500 acres of land — 90% of it maintained in its natural state so habitat for plants and wildlife is a priority. Doing so preserves clean water and air, supports plant and wildlife biodiversity, and provides beautiful places where people can connect with nature.

MetroParks' origin story rooted in land protection still plays out today. The agency has land protection goals that are strategic and visionary, focused on MetroParks' mission to protect the region's natural heritage.

"Five Rivers MetroParks is a conservation agency, and the public has told us they want MetroParks to protect the Miami Valley's natural resources," said Eric Sauer, MetroParks' planning manager. "We're not interested in buying every available property. We strategically protect land that is adjacent to existing MetroParks, that has distinct natural features, or that connects existing open space, particularly along streams and rivers to strengthen riparian buffers and wildlife corridors."

Some of those strategic land acquisitions may one day expand an existing MetroPark or conservation area — or become a new MetroPark or conservation area. In some cases, a conservation area — land MetroParks owns and manages that may not have developed public access — becomes a MetroPark, as will be the case with Spring Run Conservation Area. MetroParks has been converting this land, once farmland and a golf course, to native grassland, forest and wetlands for nearly a decade. Just this August, additional wetland

restoration work began with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. Spring Run's 540 acres are adjacent to Sycamore State Park – providing a large area for wildlife habitat and open space protection in western Montgomery County.

"We're being very specific and almost surgical about what lands we take on so MetroParks is meeting the public's priorities to protect our waterways and maintain our parks," Scarff said. "We also look to make sure we improve ecological corridors for wildlife while not overburdening our operational responsibilities and wisely spending tax dollars."

What follows is info about two of Five Rivers MetroParks' more recent land acquisitions and the plans to ensure these properties make Montgomery County's environment healthier now and for generations to come.

Foxton Court Apartments

The city of Dayton approached Five Rivers MetroParks about purchasing the 10-acre property once home to these apartments, severely damaged in the 2019 tornadoes, and an adjacent 58-acre city-owned property. Grants from Clean Ohio and the Greater Dayton Disaster Relief Fund supported the acquisition of the land along Needmore Road.

MetroParks hopes to finish demolition of the remaining apartment structures, utilities and pavement by early next year. Because the apartments were located in a floodplain, built prior to legislation prohibiting this, they could not have been rebuilt. Instead, the property will be restored to a natural area, seeded with a restorative prairie mix that will regenerate soils. This restoration also will add greenspace to the neighborhood and to Wegerzyn Gardens MetroPark.

Both properties met several MetroParks' land acquisition goals, including their location along a river corridor, the opportunity to return an area to its natural habitat and strengthening wildlife habitat.

"On top of that, for the community, it removes a blight on our landscape," Scarff said. "It removes a significant reminder of the tornadoes along a very busy road."

Whitesell Property

This 63-acre property, former farmland located near Frederick Pike and Needmore Road, expanded the Stillwater Conservation Area. It met two of MetroParks' land protection goals: protect natural areas adjacent to river corridors and establish buffers for natural areas.

Work is underway to transition the land from its prior agricultural use to a natural area with native grasses and wildflowers. "You'll see some pretty significant changes within a year," Sauer said. "The bigger impact will be in the second to fourth years, and eventually, long after we're here, it will be a woodland."

This land acquisition also created a new way for the public to support MetroParks' conservation mission to protect the region's natural heritage: the Five Rivers MetroParks Foundation's Land Conservation Endowment Fund. Now,

donors can financially support MetroParks' conservation efforts while also funding an endowment. Visit metroparks.org/foundation to support the new Land Conservation Endowment Fund.

Local scientists conduct conservation research in the field – literally

Nature can be a classroom at every stage in life, from early childhood well into adulthood. This is especially true for those who have committed their life's work to conservation.

Last April, Five Rivers MetroParks, with support of the Five Rivers MetroParks Foundation, offered a research grant for scientists to conduct or plan to conduct research on MetroParks' land. The grant awarded up to \$5,000 to those conducting studies related to ecology, conservation and biology. The grant – designed to assist with equipment, travel, stipends and other costs – was awarded to two local scientists affiliated with the University of Dayton and Wright State University.

University of Dayton student Michaela Woods is conducting ongoing research at the Great Miami Mitigation Bank, which began in 2019. Woods and fellow students have planted a variety of seed mixes with different treatments, such as using mulch and adding soil. These seeds were planted with the intention to understand the best restoration practices for converting what was once agricultural land back to prairies and forests.

Twenty research plots were established and planted with different seed mixes where land was previously farmed. This research related directly to the restoration goals for the Great Miami Mitigation Bank, which will become the future Spring Run MetroPark, and spaces across MetroParks and the Midwest.

"Research is essential to understand our environment and create more efficient land management practices to conserve and protect it," said MetroParks biologist Lisa Zoromski. "Collaboration with local universities has greatly improved MetroParks' conservation practices." A master's student at Wright State University, Ari Zakroff, joined by Dr. John Stireman, are studying arthropod food webs and the impact of invasive forest shrubs. Zakroff's fieldwork has taken him to almost every MetroPark, with MetroParks conservation staff assisting him by helping identify arthropods — invertebrate animals with a large exoskeleton and segmented body, such as spiders — and invasive shrubs. Though there is a widespread distribution of invasive shrubs, there is a lack of scientific publications on how they impact arthropods. Zakroff's research will shed some light on how these invasive plants affect arthropod food webs and contribute to the biodiversity and ecosystem as compared to native woody plants.

"Throughout a year, there are about a dozen research permits administered through Five Rivers MetroParks," said Zoromski. "Projects cover a wide range of topics including aquatic insects, forest ecology, wildlife, plants, fungi and climate change."

Indeed, research conducted on MetroParks' land helps guide its conservation staff, who are at the forefront of MetroParks' mission to protect the region's natural heritage. Those who are interested in learning more about local researchers, contemplate their study questions, hear their stories and learn what they have discovered, can attend an EcoTalk Oct. 19 at Cox Arboretum MetroPark. As the saying goes: "We do not inherit the Earth from our ancestors; we borrow it from our children."

Indeed, future generations will not only have to live in the world we leave them, they will have to figure out how to navigate its environmental challenges — and there are many.

Inspiring today's youth to become good stewards of the natural world is critical to MetroParks' mission to protect the region's natural heritage. Starting with Conservation Kids programming — which focuses on children ages 3 through 13 — MetroParks invites children to explore nature through hands-on, educational experiences.

Now, MetroParks' outdoor education, parks and conservation, and volunteer staff — with additional support from The James M. Cox, Jr. Arboretum Foundation — have collaborated to provide a new series of programs that allow older youth to take their education, advocacy and service to the next level.

"We continued to see that older youth were close to or aging out of Conservation Kids programming but still wanted to be engaged," said education specialist Erin Rowekamp. "At the time, we didn't have that many opportunities we could direct them to so they could continue to grow as conservationists. We also heard from parents that there were not many volunteer opportunities for teens in the greater Dayton area."

Conservation Leaders, a new program series introduced this past summer, addresses those concerns:

- It offers multifaceted programs that allow youth ages
 10 through 17 to deepen their connection with nature in many ways.
- Participants in Conservation Leaders programs explore Dayton's local ecology and help with various conservation projects.
- These programs are paired with Conservation Leaders in Action volunteer opportunities, in which older youth participate in conservation projects that help improve biodiversity in the MetroParks.

"Conservation Leaders really allows participants to have a sense of ownership of the projects they are involved in and gain a deeper understanding of local environmental issues and what they can to do affect positive change," Rowekamp said. "Plus, teens can earn service hours while exploring a potential career."

Already, Conservation Leaders participants have planted native plugs around Sugarcreek MetroPark's new wetland

and removed trash that had washed into Woodman Fen Conservation Area.

Conservation Leaders also will use the skills they build to help inspire their younger peers during Conservation Kids programs. Teens will assist staff, share their knowledge and experiences in the field, and engage more reserved participants who may open up to someone closer to their age.

"It can be difficult for youth to find their voice, and perhaps even harder to find a place to start when they care so much about the significant environmental issues of the world," Rowekamp said. "This program helps teens recognize their influence, power and voice in standing up for conservation. As an added benefit, these participants develop confidence and leadership skills that will stay with them forever."

According to a JAMA Pediatrics study, recreational screen time nearly doubled during the pandemic, with teens spending more than seven hours of screen time a day. Encouraging youth to spend more time outdoors partaking in nature-based activities has its benefits, from improved mood and concentration to reduced anger.

The new Conservation Leaders program "helps teens recognize their influence, power and voice in standing up for conservation. As an added benefit, these participants develop confidence and leadership skills that will stay with them forever."

"Fall fishing is great because the temps are cooling, both in the air and the water," said outdoor recreation specialist and fishing expert Kelly Kingery. "Fish come up from the deeper summer pools where they have been hanging out in cooler waters and are now feeding closer to the surface — or in shallower water — due to the cooler weather. Fall is a good time to get out there before temps drop in winter and their metabolism slows down, making fish less hungry and more lethargic."

Having a great fishing experience starts with safety. A lifejacket is recommended for everyone who is near the water. This also includes those who are fly fishing in the water or on a watercraft.

Anglers also should dress appropriately for the weather. Often, Ohio's fall weather means chilly mornings and warmer afternoons. Dress in layers to ensure you can be comfortable throughout the day. Though you may not have to worry about insect repellent in fall, everyone who visits the outdoors should bring sun protection. And what would a day of fishing be without snacks? Pack plenty of water and food to fuel you throughout the day.

New and experienced anglers can enjoy fishing opportunities in every MetroPark with the exception of Cox Arboretum, Hills & Dales, and Sugarcreek MetroParks. At the destinations below, you can fish without a license:

- Carriage Hill MetroPark (Cedar Lake and Northwoods Pond)
- Eastwood MetroPark (Lagoon and Blue Lake)
- Germantown MetroPark (Sunfish Pond)
- Possum Creek MetroPark (Argonne Lake and stocked fishing ponds)
- Twin Creek MetroPark (Lake George)

Kingery also recommends trying fishing in rivers, such as the Great Miami River (Taylorsville MetroPark) and the tree-hugged Twin Creek (Germantown MetroPark).

With the appropriate gear — such as tackle, lures and bait — anglers in this region can expect to catch a variety of fish. While you may not catch a 4-foot, profile-picture-worthy catfish on every outing, people may be able to catch anything from large mouth bass to bluegill.

If you're an angler who is ready to try something new or new to fishing all together, consider participating in MetroParks' fall fly fishing programs. These programs teach you the basics of fly fishing, both on flat water and in rivers. Registration is required for these adult programs, which will provide you with the skills needed to fly fish. Professional instructors cover necessary gear, flies and casting.





VOLUNTEERING is for THE BIRDS

In the 1890s, house sparrows and European starlings found their way to the United States, competing with existing bluebirds for nesting sites. This bird boom and loss of habitat due to increased development meant that, by the early 1900s, bluebird populations had dwindled by 90%.

Fast forward to the 1930s, when birdhouses became popular. People noticed when these houses were monitored, it was bluebirds who took up residence in

these cozy homes rather than house sparrows.

During the years since, bluebird populations have continued to increase incrementally. However, there's still work to do, as such food sources as insects and habitats continue to decrease – both integral to the survival of these beautiful native birds.

Since the early 2000s, Five Rivers MetroParks has had bluebird boxes in several of its MetroParks that have been monitored by volunteers. Monitoring these birds helps



trends, observe how bluebirds are reacting to different environmental changes and more.

"Volunteers help clean the bluebird boxes, report what they find and help with conservation," said MetroParks biologist Lisa Zoromski.

During last winter, park and conservation staff took a deep dive into bluebird research and reassessed the number of boxes in MetroParks. While many boxes were removed, the best boxes and predator guards remain, and the monitoring process has been streamlined to a digital format.

"This is an independent volunteer opportunity that can be flexible with anyone's schedule, which makes it a great family volunteer opportunity," Zoromski said.

Current bluebird monitoring volunteer Rachel Lovano discovered an interest in birdwatching after becoming part of this conservation opportunity.

"It's a great way to learn about birds, nest and egg identification, and it's amazing to see the whole process in all the stages," Lovano said. "It's been an eye-opening education on conservation, invasive species, and nesting birds, and has promoted me to put up boxes in my own back yard to monitor and help the bluebirds."

Lovano also finds volunteering a great way to stay active outdoors.

"It's a great excuse to get outside and take a walk at the park," she said.

Conservation technician Nicole Freshour also recommends this activity as a great introduction to participating in long-term citizen science projects. She supports adding a few boxes to your yard and attracting birds with appropriate food, water and cover — including native plants.

"NestWatch.org is a fantastic website for background information on setting up and monitoring nest boxes," Freshour said. "It is also a great way to share your data with everyone and keep track through the years to see how successful your boxes have been."

The Garden Club of Dayton CELEBRATES 100 YEARS

– of service with new ———

CENTENNIAL OVERLOOK

A key vision of the Dayton Riverfront Plan has begun thanks to a generous philanthropic gift from The Garden Club of Dayton.

In its 100th year, The Garden Club of Dayton has committed to provide Five Rivers MetroParks with a \$100,000 gift to support the construction of Centennial Overlook. It will include a sound sculpture echoing water flow in the river and the native pollinator plants that line its banks.

The project began in summer 2022 and plans call for it to be completed in spring 2023. When planning its centennial, The Garden Club of Dayton specifically looked for a project that would mark its 100th year connecting the community to the wonders of nature through protection and education.

"The Garden Club of Dayton and Five Rivers MetroParks have been partners and collaborators all of MetroParks' nearly 60-year history," said MetroParks chief of planning and projects Carrie Scarff. "They have supported so many projects and are a leading example of the philanthropic mindset that is typical of Dayton."

Indeed, your Five Rivers MetroParks may not exist as it does today without conservation-minded women, such as Marie Aull and Jean Woodhull, who were members of The Garden Club of Dayton. Over the years, The Garden Club of Dayton has been instrumental in the creation of some of the community's most valued MetroParks assets: RiverScape MetroPark, Adventure Central at Wesleyan MetroPark, the Mad River and RiverScape River Runs, the campus at Cox Arboretum MetroPark, and the Children's Discovery Garden at Wegerzyn Gardens MetroPark.

"Support from the local community has always been how Dayton has gotten things done, and MetroParks has been fortunate to receive that support many times," said Scarff. The Garden Club of Dayton saw the opportunity to help create a space in Sunrise MetroPark, located in Dayton's west side, which is seeing a resurgence of commitment and investment. The Centennial Overlook project will highlight and educate people about the high-quality river ecology that thrives in Dayton's downtown corridor. Scores of bird species have been identified in this area and the plantings that will be used in this area will support those species while also attracting pollinators.

Centennial Overlook is the first step toward the Dayton Riverfront Plan's vision to create a park over the river that would include greenspaces, benches, public art and other amenities. This pedestrian park would connect the existing Sunrise MetroPark, including Centennial Overlook, to a new Sunset Park proposed to be located across the river.

"Research has shown there are physical and mental health benefits for those who live within 0.5 miles of a park, particularly children," said Scarff. "Our rivers provide so much of our greenspace in Dayton and reach so deeply into neighborhoods that it's important we take advantage of those spaces to serve the surrounding residents. Through strong community partnerships, such as with The Garden Club of Dayton, the community can reap the many benefits of natural spaces."




