MINUTES OF SPECIAL MEETING FINANCIAL HEALTH DISCUSSION BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS FIVE RIVERS METROPARKS

March 8, 2024

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners (BOPC) was held at Five Rivers MetroParks Main Office, 409 E. Monument Avenue, Dayton, Ohio, on March 8, 2024, and convened at 9:22 a.m. on a roll call vote by the Board of Park Commissioners.

Financial Health Discussion:

- Chief Executive Officer Karen Hesser presented the BOPC with information gathered in response to their request for staff to explore cuts and look inward for solutions to address the agency's budgetary deficit to address repair and replacement needs.
 - The leadership team has reviewed additional ways that MetroParks can tighten our financial belt with operational cuts while still maintaining public engagement. Cutting budgets is not new for MetroParks. We have been evaluating and cutting budgets for more than a decade. Discretionary operational budgets have remained essentially frozen since 2012, with fluctuations due only to legal and contractual obligations to increase it or budgetary items such as utilities.
 - Capital budgets have averaged \$2.2 million per year, with Capital spending for new amenities since 2019 totaling only \$172,007, representing less than 2% of the overall total capital spend. The agency's Comprehensive Master Plan adopted in 2016, recommends new capital spending at \$660,000 \$1,000,000 per year.
 - The team has identified \$700,000 from the 2024 budget that will be reallocated to deferred maintenance. This will affect the Operating Budget and Personnel, requiring freezing certain positions, which will impact all areas of the agency. Positions will be continually evaluated for unintended consequences. These reductions would stay in place until a replacement levy is secured.
 - Potential public impacts include the reduction of public programs, the elimination of major events and pausing the implementation of The Suns.

• The BOPC was presented with a summary of options for a Replacement Levy in either 2024, 2025, or 2026. Each would cost the average taxpayer \$43/year or \$3.58/month.
